

### **History of our Favorite Winter Pastimes**

- The first time ice hockey was officially played as an Olympic sport was at the 1920 <u>Summer</u> Olympics. It wasn't until 1924 that the Winter Olympics began.
- The largest snowball fight recorded was achieved by 5,834 participants at an event organized by Seattle Snow Day, Washington, on January 12, 2013.
- The earliest archaeological examples of skis were found in Russia and date to 5000 B.C. Although modern skiing has evolved from beginnings in Scandinavia, 10,000 year old wall paintings suggest use of skis in the Xinjiang region of what is now China.
- The record for the most people making snow angels simultaneously is 8,962 at the State Capitol Grounds in Bismarck, North Dakota for an event organized by the State Historical Society of North Dakota on February 17, 2007.
- Most historians believe that the first pair of ice skates dates back to between 3000 and 1000 B.C., and were invented by the Scandinavians. Regardless of the exact time ice skates were invented, they were made from animal bones taken from horses, cattle, elk, oxen and other animals. Skaters tied these bones to the bottom of a pair of boots or shoes and glided across frozen lakes and ponds.
- The Ojibwa Indians employed spears in the earliest form of ice fishing. After chipping holes in the ice, the Indians waited for a fish to swim to a decoy they made out of wood.
- Sleds may be a winter pastime for us, but they also work on sand and Ancient Egyptians used large sleds to help with construction, such as transporting large obelisks.
- The current world record for skiing is nearly 157 mph, held by Simone Origone. Speed skiers regularly exceed 125 mph, which is even faster than the speed of a free-falling skydiver (120 mph).



### **Perfect Pork Loin**

Combine these rub ingredients in a small lidded container and shake to mix thoroughly:

- 1/4 cup kosher or sea salt
- 1 TBSP sugar
- 2 tsp ground sage
- 1/2 tsp marjoram
- 1 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1 tsp paprika or smoked paprika
- 1 1/2 tsp garlic powder



Coat all sides and ends of a pork loin with the above rub and place in a foil-lined pan with low sides. Roast uncovered at 375° until internal temperature reaches 145°. Remove from oven and let sit for about 15 minutes, lighted tented with foil. When carved, the pork should be moist and juicy, but not pink.
