- According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Minnesota is the top turkey-producing state in America.
- The National Turkey Federation estimated that about 46 million turkeys—one fifth of the annual total of 235 million consumed in the United States—are eaten at Thanksgiving.
- Three towns in the U.S. take their name from the traditional Thanksgiving bird, including Turkey, Texas (pop. 465); Turkey Creek, Louisiana (pop. 363); and Turkey, North Carolina (pop. 270).
- Originally known as Macy's Christmas Parade—to signify the launch of the Christmas shopping season—the first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade took place in New York City in 1924. It was launched by Macy's employees and featured animals from the Central Park Zoo.
- Snoopy has appeared as a giant balloon in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade more times than any other character in history.
- Only male turkeys, called toms, gobble. Females, called hens, cackle.
- George Washington proclaimed the first nationwide thanksgiving celebration in America on November 26, 1789.
- The author of Mary Had A Little Lamb, Sarah Josepha Hale, waged a campaign to make Thanksgiving a national holiday and in 1863, Abraham Lincoln declared that the Last Thursday of November would be Thanksgiving Day across the nation.

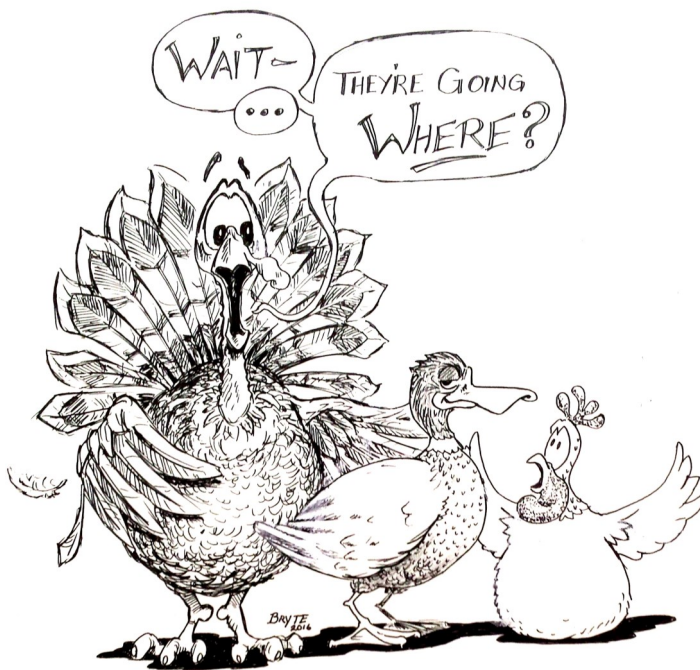

Amazing Sweet Potato Casserole

6 large sweet potatoes or yams

3/4 c. sugar

2 eggs, beaten

1/2 c. melted butter

1/2 c. cream

1 tsp vanilla

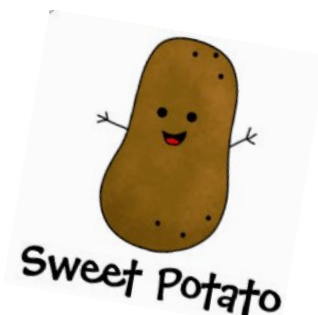
Crumb topping:

1 1/2 c. packed brown sugar

1 1/2 c. chopped pecans

1/2 c. flour

1/3 c. butter



- Peel, cube, boil, & mash the sweet potatoes (just as you would do with regular mashed potatoes)
- Blend in sugar, eggs, butter, cream, & vanilla, then pour into a greased casserole dish.
- Combine ingredients for the crumb topping & sprinkle over the top of potatoes.
- Bake uncovered @ 350 for 40 minutes, or until hot and bubbling.
